

Finding Lines and Planes

LINES: To find the equation of line, you need

1. ANY POINT ON THE LINE
2. ANY DIRECTION VECTOR PARALLEL TO THE LINE
3. Then one parameterization of the line is: $\mathbf{r} = \mathbf{r}_0 + t\mathbf{v}$.

PLANES: To find the equation of a plane, you need

1. ANY POINT ON THE LINE
2. ANY NORMAL VECTOR TO THE PLANE
3. Then any vector on the plane must be orthogonal to \mathbf{n} so we get the equation: $\mathbf{n} \cdot (\mathbf{r} - \mathbf{r}_0) = 0$.
